Our School Report Card - NAPLAN 2011 Highlights 2011

100% sat the test in Year 3 and Year 5. Almost 100% of students sat the test in Year 7 with one student absent for each part of the test in Year 7, and two absent for maths.

We've continued with the practice of encouraging all students, even those with disabilities and learning difficulties to sit the tests, so growth can be measured from year to year. Only one student was exempted.

Impressive Progress in Maths and Numeracy

Our results show our students have worked especially hard in maths over the past two years, with a very high level of progress for students since they last sat the test. A huge 59% of students in Year 5 were in the top band for progress when their Year 3 and Year 5 results were compared,

And in Year 7, 37% of students were in the top band for progress when their Year 5 and Year 7 results were compared.

This level of progress is the same as is achieved by the top 25% of students nationally.

Our results were not good in all areas, however. Over the page you will see all our NAPLAN results for this year (alongside the state means, national means and our last year achievement.)

Areas for Improvement

What areas were our weak areas for 2011?

- Year 3 results across the board
- Writing from Years 3—7

It is fair to say that we did not do as well at Year 3 level in any area as we did last year. We have a lot of students with learning difficulties and disabilities at this year level, and our teachers work very hard to assist all students; the capable and the less capable, to take the next steps in their learning. We will be working very hard so that our Year 3s achieve very good progress when they next sit the NAPLAN in 2013 as Year 5 students.

And, it is also fair to say that we didn't do as well in writing From Year 3 to Year 7 this year. Writing was an area that we achieved so well in last year— as the table on the left shows.

Last year the writing task was a narrative text, this year's task was persuasive

writing, a text type our students are less familiar with. Our teachers attended workshops specifically in persuasive writing, modified our marking rubrics and taught lessons accordingly, so they thought they had prepared their classes well. Our teachers will be looking at the tasks, and the marking rubrics, and using the next two terms to assist all students from Year 2—7 to become more confident with persuasive writing.

South Australian Literacy & Numeracy Results in Perspective

In the Advertiser 10 September there was the statement "in 14 of the 20 categories, SA students performed worse this year than they did last year." The fact is that in 15/16 categories they are the same as last year. In the Advertiser 20 September, "the results were the worst posted since NAPLAN began in 2008 with more students in SA failing to reach the national minimum standards." In fact, the 2011 results were best in three aspects, second in four aspects and third in five aspects and worst in four aspects.

The results for SA are consistent with previous years in that they confirm that more than 90% of South Australian students continue to achieve at or above the national minimum standards for literacy and numeracy. (For our school this is higher). When compared to national other state averages, the averages for South Australian students are similar to those for Queensland, Western Australia and Tasmania. South Australian results have remained stable over the four years of testing. (Our school scores are better than 2009, but not as good as 2010.)

Working Bee Heroes

In the garden we were able to paint the timber palings for a chook house we are planning to build next term, construct two new garden beds, mulch paths, turn over the library garden and weed and mulch flower beds around the school.

Term 3 Bully Audit results

Every term in week 7 we conduct our 'bully audit' by asking students to complete a questionnaire to let us know if they've been bullied in the yard or in the class, and to name students who bully them. Students who are named by 4 children or more have counselling and lessons to support them on how to treat others better. This term 90% of students reported no bullying in the classroom, 86% reported no bullying in the yard, and only 3 students were named by 4 or more others for bullying other students. We take any instances of bullying very seriously, so please let us know if you think your child may be being bullied at any time.
