

# Thankyou parents for your feedback!

We were delighted with the high response rate from parents to our parent surveys this year. Thankyou to all who responded. We appreciate your time and effort . Your responses are being taken into consideration in our plans for next year.

#### Preschool Survey

- 42% of preschool families returned their surveys.
- The Preschool survey is particularly valuable, as it is the first time we have had a significant response to a Preschool survey. It highlights real strengths, and also highlights areas for improvement, which will form the basis of the Preschool improvement plan, required under the National Quality Standard.
- An extremely high rating of 4.75 on a 5 point scale was given for the question "staff interactions with my child are positive, responsive and build trusting relationships.
- Also rated very high at 4.71 for both, were the statements" The preschool environment is interesting and stimulating and is also safe and supportive" and "The preschool has a welcoming and caring environment"

*The survey helps us identify areas to work on too.* We were rated lower than we would like for 10 statements, 6 dealing with opportunities to have a say, seeking parent opinion; involvement in preschool involvement in decision making/ involvement through Governing Council, and several dealing with reporting or keeping informed of children's progress. These areas will form the basis of the Preschool Improvement Plan for the next year.

#### School Survey

- 42% of school families returned the parent opinion survey
- Parents put a great deal of time and consideration into comments and suggestions, and we thank you for this. It will take us a long time to work our way through the suggestions, and we are starting this week in staff meeting with a look at suggestions on feedback to parents, a second round of interviews offered in Term 3 each year, homework and our work with gifted children.
- Some responses will have an impact on our Site Learning Plan. *Keep watching the newsletter in the next year. You will find quotes from the parent survey and responses with your ideas implemented into our plans. We will let you know.*
- **The parent survey rated us highly** (4.1 on a 5 point scale) for the quality of our teaching and learning programs, and this is significantly higher than the state responses.
- *The survey also has identified areas for us to work on.* As for the preschool, this is in seeking parent opinions about educational programs, participation in decisions about education, opportunity to be involved in develop-

ment of school plans and including parents in decision making.



While comments show the students reports are well regarded by parents, responses to questions indicate that feedback in other ways can be improved, and that a broader variety of communication strategies could be used by the school.

We have 2 instrumental teachers who come to our school.




Lessons are conducted during school hours. **Ray Sadler** teaches **brass** and **woodwind instruments.**

#### \$2 Charge for the Kitchen Garden Programme– What is your Opinion?

"I think the Stephanie Alexander Kitchen Garden Program is beneficial to my child's learning in sustainable gardening and or science"

In our parent survey, our school families strongly supported this statement. Parent response scored 4.4 on a 5 point scale where 4 is agree, and 5 is strongly agree.

The Kitchen Garden Programme has been up and running for two and a half terms now. Most parents have seen the benefits... productive vegetable gardens, with children actively involved in the gardens; bright, eager students chopping, peeling, frying, tasting, (and setting tables and clearing up). Now, as the end of the year is approaching, we are reviewing our budget for 2011 and planning our budget for 2012. We are also reviewing the \$2 cost of the program.

The proposed budget will be put to Parents and Friends group for consultation and will be taken to Finance Committee for approval. Early indications are that some sort of student charge will need to continue. Governing Council is very mindful of the cost of this program and other excursions and activities to parents and have kept the proposed increase in Materials and Services charges to well below the CPI, and this was the case for 2011 also.

There are some difficulties in the way we are collecting the \$2 at the moment (bring money on the day, give to teacher, no receipts). It is difficult to keep track and follow up on missed payments, records can be missed, especially if there is a TRT, and some families are not contributing. We are exploring alternative methods for collecting which are still family friendly. One method is to invoice families once a term for the cost for lessons for the term. (eg. \$8 if 4 lessons, \$10 if 5) The invoice could include other excursions/performances for the term, minimising the number of payments to be made by families per term. **My opinion on the way a charge should be collected is:**

#### What's been happening in the Year 6/7 classrooms

Mrs Chatfield, Miss Copeland and Mrs Sarres class have been working on a new theme of marvellous micro-organisms. They are learning about the 5 types of micro-organisms and how they impact on our world. They had fun tasting 11 foods which rely on micro-organisms in their production. In maths, they have been working on volume and capacity, they will shortly be moving onto algebra. All three classes have been competing in the Global

Children's Challenge by wearing pedometers and keeping a record of our daily steps. It is great to see the kids becoming competitive and the daily averages increasing. Once they take step length into account, some of our students walk over 10km each day! They have started Footsteps dance lessons and are working on graduation preparation. Most exciting however-the Canberra Trip has been booked for October 22-26 next year. They have also welcomed two pre-service teachers who are working in well with the whole 6/7 unit.

### News from Room 15

The Reception students from room 15 held a Tuna Toss as part of their inquiry into celebrations. The tuna was large and the children practised their technique before trying to set a record. As the excitement built teachers were asked to participate including Mrs Lewis. The children were very excited when Mrs Lewis took to the field!! In the end Mrs Stone was able to throw the tuna the furthest on the day. Children not only learnt about one of South Australia's great celebrations but also learnt how to measure using a

variety of methods.

#### Information for Parents on the benefits of Christian Pastoral Support Program

In making an informed choice for your school about continuing the funding for the chaplaincy service provided to your school community, we would like to draw to your attention the following benefits:

- Christian Pastoral Support Workers (CPS Workers) have a distinct role in schools that offers an additional dimension of care that is not offered by any other members of staff. The CPSW role complements the DECS wellbeing framework with practical assistance as needs arise.
- CPS Workers are selected for their skills and experience in active listening, fostering relationships of trust, networking, linking, and referring to appropriate support.
- CPS Workers serve the community in a "first-response capacity" by providing pastoral care, spiritual support and referral to specialist crisis support. The role also provides ongoing support and follow-up.
- CPS Workers are uniquely resourced to support and resource students who have questions of a spiritual or faith nature.
- The role has strong links and partnership with the local community that may add additional value in financial assistance for extra hours and volunteer support, CPS Workers most often already know the local community because they are part of the community.
- CPS Workers work in partnership with other caring professionals on staff and in the wider community, yet have a unique and distinctive role.
- CPS Workers model tolerance of diversity, respect of differences, and school values.
- Chaplaincy in schools is not new, having started in SA schools 25 years ago, and Chaplains have long been in the emergency services, hospitals, the defence forces, and even professional sporting teams. The chaplaincy model is a highly valued and integral part of everyday society.
- SMG has been coordinating program for over 20 years, and can lend our experience and support in making it as easy as possible for schools in administering the program and meeting all funding requirements over the whole cycle of the program; SMG currently supports over 300 schools in SA with CPS Workers, and has a close working relationship with DECS.
- Choosing funding for chaplaincy under the NSCSWP will ensure continuity of your existing worker, allowing the already established role and relationships to benefit your school community.

In making an informed choice for your school about applying for funding for the chaplaincy service, we would also like to clarify that the role excludes:

proselytizing, evangelising, or promoting a particular set of beliefs, formal religious education or instruction

Information regarding the Christian Pastoral Support Programme You may be aware that the Australian Government recently announced a funding programme to provide Christian Pastoral Support Programme (known federally as the chaplaincy programme) **or** student welfare services to schools across the country. In making this announcement, they indicated that grants of up to \$20,000 would be available for each school.

We have received information about the possibilities of establishing the programme at our school from Schools Ministry Group who will oversee the Chaplaincy Program. Support from our school community is vital for submitting an application for funding. We would only seek to establish a programme if our community supports it.

#### **Chaplaincy Programme Information**

The Schools Ministry Group (SMG) in South Australia manages the Christian Pastoral Support Programme (CPS). SMG coordinates and facilitates Christian ministry in government schools and has a contract with DECD to oversee the program. SMG employs and assists schools in the selection process, as well as providing DECD (previously DECS) approved and endorsed training and development for CPS Workers. SMG has been successfully managing this programme in schools in SA for the past 20 years. While the group is statewide, local members of the group are involved in supporting schools to establish the CPS programme.

If we decided to pursue the establishment of a programme in our school, both a Governing Council member or parent representative, and the Principal would be members of the selection panel. Along with a member of the local Christian community who also financially contribute toward the program is providing additional Chaplaincy hours.

The programme seeks to support students, parents, carers and staff in their day-to-day work, as well as providing greater links community groups and resources. There are three components of the programme that a CPS Worker will provide to assist schools. *The benefits of the Chaplaincy program are outlined in this flier in the newsletter.* 

A Christian Pastoral Support Worker is not a Student Counsellor, but is able to refer to other support services. The CPS Worker would be an extra support person who works in collaboration with other staff to provide support to all sections of our school community.

If our application is successful we will receive funding for the programme sometime into the 2012 year.
