Changes in Preschool Term 2– Off to a flying start!

Feedback from parents and teachers indicates that our changed structure for the preschool, (with children coming to two full day sessions and a fortnightly Friday session) have been quite smooth. Term 1 Bully Audit Results

Last term as usual in Week 7 all students in the school confidentially completed a 'Bully Audit' questionnaire, to let us know how safe students are feeling in the yard and in the classroom. These are the results:

% of students who reported no bullying in yard=	80%
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% of students who reported no bullying in class=	91%
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While the results show that the vast majority have not experienced any bullying at all, we would still hope to have a much lower percentage of students experiencing bullying, especially in the yard. This term we will be focussing on our Super Seven 'including others', since feeling left out and ignored by others was identified as an issue on a large number of students' Bully Audits.

We will also be starting our lunchtime counselling sessions for students who were named on 4 or more students' Bully Audits. These sessions give these students the opportunity to reflect on their behaviour and set goals for getting along better with others. We have found this to be a very powerful way to make students aware of the impact of their behaviour on others, and to reduce incidents of bullying as a result.

If you think your child is being bullied, or is unhappy at school for any reason, please report it to Margie Sarre. We are as committed to supporting student wellbeing as we are to supporting their academic achievement.

National Walk Safely To School Day is on 18 May
It's that time of year when parents and primary school-aged children right around Australia are asked to take those important steps towards a healthier lifestyle by participating in National Walk Safely to School Day.

This year, to discover a way that might be different from driving the car, carers and students can find the best walking route to school online at www.walk.com.au. Parents and students can enter their home starting point and the school destination – and the new feature will plot the best walking route to school, maybe through quiet, safe side streets or local parkland.



The Walk Safely To School event asks parents, carers and their children to build regular walking to and from school into their daily routine because **children need a minimum of 60 minutes' exercise each day**. It also encourages parents to drive less and walk more, aiming to decrease dangerous vehicle congestion around schools and reduce carbon emissions from cars. If you can't walk all the way to school, walk your child to the next bus stop away from your home. Or, if you have to drive, park the car a few blocks away and walk the rest of the way.

We encourage all students, staff and parents to walk or ride to school on Friday May 18th. Why not join with a few neighbours and make a 'walking bus'? The Celebrations Forum leaders will visit classes to give stickers to walkers and riders at school on Friday. Happy walking!

Term 1 classes had children being very busy and productive planting, seed trays, seeds direct and the seedlings they had grown, preparing beds, mulching, tending the worm farms and compost bins, potting up new seedlings or strawberry runners, collecting seeds and having lots of fun **gaining Wheelbarrow and Tool Licences** while learning how to safely use the tools of the trade. Licences will be received this term when all class members have completed the tasks.



Harvests have included basil, beans, beetroot, brocolini, cabbages, capsicum, carrots, chives, celery, corn, kale, khole rabi, mint, onions, oregano, parsley, parsnip, potatoes, rocket, rockmelon, sage, spinach, silverbeet, spring onions, strawberries, tomatoes and zucchini.

The Mount Barker Show was an opportunity to enter our vegetables into the following eight sections: Carrot, Beetroot, Silverbeet, Potatoes, Tomatoes, Cherry Tomatoes, Parsley and a selection of 6 vegies (which included Eggplant, Capsicum, Parsnip, Carrot, Brocolini and Spring Onion). We are very pleased to report that **five prizes were obtained** out of the eight entries, two Second Prizes for potatoes and 6 veg and three Third Prizes for Carrots, Beetroot and Silverbeet.

As we are now half way through Autumn and as Term 2 classes have had a damp start, I would like to take this opportunity to **remind children to bring along a raincoat** (and hat if required) and perhaps some rubber boots to class. Classes will continue in light to moderate rain.

Australian Schools Competitions

The competitions are conducted through the University of New South Wales Educational Testing Centre, and are for Primary students from Years 3 to Year 7 in Science, Writing, Spelling, Mathematics and English. The competitions provide opportunities for students to be assessed in an external testing situation and are also used to recognise and reward achievement. Students can enter any number of competitions, however, entry fees must be lodged by the due date (see below). If your child is interested in an extra challenge, then this is a great opportunity.
