## Celebrating National Numeracy Week at LPS

What a buzz it was to be in our school last Friday. Thank you to the many Dads and Mums, grandparents and family members who joined in our school celebrations for National Numeracy Week. I estimate we welcomed approximately 150 visitors to our Family Maths Morning. Many classrooms were full, with standing room only in some rooms. It was a delight to see how excited the students were to show you not just what they are learning, but how they learn Maths. During the morning we also hosted four teachers visiting from Eastern Fleurieu School who came to observe in our classrooms. They all commented what an active and exciting range of Maths activities our students were involved in.
Our class teachers chose to show you the different activities and strategies they have been successfully implementing in Maths. A wide range of activities and tasks were on the go across the school, including problem solving tasks, partner games, using technology and mental routines. Activities included solving whose lunch box held the most, making and using a calendar page, using the STAR model to solve word problems and students playing games they had designed and made themselves. Our students were enthusiastic and confident as they worked together. What stood out as I visited each room were the vibrant and focussed conversations children were having with adults about Maths. Maths lessons are rarely the silent and still lessons I remember as a student. As teachers, we value conversations and discussions in Maths so students can share the strategies they have used. During many activities but not all, students are given the opportunity to work in pairs or teams as they solve problems.
Much of our work in Maths has been influenced by our work with Ann Baker this year. Ann has shared clear strategies we can use to better teach students to solve number problems in their head and has introduced us to a language we can all use to describe how we group and manipulate numbers mentally, without the use of pen and paper. After each session with Ann, our teachers chose an aspect of their Maths teaching they wanted to focus on. Some teachers chose to focus on the beginning of each Maths lesson to include a routine that involved all students getting involved in answering closed question where the answer is either right or wrong and open questions where a range of answers is possible to encourage the students to think more and get involved. Other teachers have been trialling more problem solving tasks to encourage the students to use the Maths they know. All teachers have been making more time at the end of each Maths lesson for the group to reflect together on the ideas and strategies they have used.
So thank you again to those of you who joined us last Friday morning. If you were unable to come, have a chat with your child/ren about the Maths they have been learning and what new strategies they are using to solve new problems.

A dedicated group of students have worked on a Primary Maths Challenge for the past 7 weeks both at home and at school. The entries from our school were selected last week and sent in to be judged as part of the State-wide competition. ## $1^{\text {ST }}$ SEPTEMBER HATS ON:

In line with our Sun Smart policy all students will be required to wear suitable broad brimmed or Legionnaire style hat, as described in the school uniform policy, whenever involved in outdoor school activities between $1^{\text {st }}$ September and $30^{\text {th }}$ April. This is the recommended position of The Cancer Council and part of our Sun Smart policy. Students not wearing a hat will be required to move to a shaded area of the school.

## Good news regarding hand washing and hygiene.

We will soon have touch free hand sanitisers in all classrooms and kitchen areas. Pak-rite have told us this is the best hand hygiene system in the world at the moment, with an innovative design and robust construction. Pak-rite provide the dispensers free of charge and the school only pays for the sanitizer. In all toilets we will have touch free foam soap dispensers also. The hand soap and sanitiser use environmentally responsible formulations. At the same time we are replacing all school toilet roll holders with 3 or 2 roll dispensers which should reduce the current waste and problems we have with cubicles running out of paper. We will be using $100 \%$ recycled paper. By using these toilet roll dispensers we should save money also.
