Flourish– Part 3 What is Resilience?

Earlier in the year I gave some information about the Flourish Project our school is involved with along with Mount Barker High School.

Resilience is an important quality for our children to develop if they are going to flourish. **What is resilience?** Resilience is the ability to grow and thrive in the face of challenges and to bounce back from adversity. Resilient people bounce, not break. When our children encounter a difficult situation or a new task, they might fail the first time they try it. How do they respond? Do they bounce back like a tennis ball, or do they break like an egg? Around the school every day, I see examples of students who show resilience. When they try a task the first time and don't succeed, rather than give up, they take their teachers advice, work through, and keep on trying.

What can parents do to help children gain resilience?

- In order for children to gain a sense of mastery or a higher self esteem, they need to experience some disappointments. **Parents must try not to rescue them.**
- **Don't solve children's' problems for them.** Ask questions like, "What can you do about that?" or What ideas can you come up with that might make things better?
- **Look for evidence that things are going well**, and that life is good... despite failures and disappointments.
- **The Three Good Things strategy** is one simple strategy that can result in children feeling happier and more resilient. Ask, what are three good things that happened today? Ask:
 - •Why did this good thing happen?
 - •What does this good thing mean to you?
 - •What can you do to make sure more of this good thing
 - happens?

Practicing this simple routine every day for a month has been proved to increase a person's positive emotion (ie happiness).

Highlights 2012

High attendance, with only one student missing one section of the test in Yr 7, 2 students absent for all tests in Year 5, and 3 students missing a section of the 5 subtests for Year 3.

We've continued with the practice of encouraging all students, even those with disabilities and learning difficulties to sit the tests, so growth can be measured from year to year. No students were exempted.

Our Year 3 did well this year.

Our Scores in Reading were good, above the National mean for all year levels, and significantly above the National mean for our Year 3s and Year 7s.

And areas for improvement?

Our students continued to have difficulty with their Persuasive. This is despite the perfect topic being set.... "I think all children should learn to cook!"

Progress Against our Targets

Progress in Maths

We have put considerable resources in our mathematics program over the last 4 years, and we have aimed to increase our scores by 3 points a year in this period. This year, we have succeeded in doing this for:

- our Year 3 cohort... who achieved a mean score 12 points above our mean in 2009, though not above our all time high in 2010.
- and for our Year 5 cohort, who achieved 25 points above the Year 5 mean in 2009.
- We did not quite achieve this for our Year 7 cohort, who achieved 5 points above the 2009 mean.

Improvements Needed in Writing

Our Year 3 students did quite well in writing, with their mean score only just below the National mean score. Our Year 5 & 7 students didn't do so well. This gives us a clear focus for 2013!

Top Band Achievement

We also congratulate these students who achieved in the top band of achievement for their year level in one or more areas. Students will be presented with certificates for achievement and progress at our next assembly.

Gardening News



The children have been very busy this term, harvesting, composting, preparing garden beds, propagating seedlings in the hot house, planting out seedlings from last term and sowing seeds direct. These have included beans, corn, pumpkin, zucchini, squash, tomatoes, basil, capsicums and eggplant, just to name a few. Harvests have included kale, peas, coriander, spring onions, leeks, parsley, mint, silver beet, chard, broccolini, and salad mix. They have also

been busy with the mosaic stepping stones; the 6/7 have been laying out their designs with tiles and the 3/4/5 classes are mixing and filling the moulds. All of this has been strongly supported by our dedicated team of volunteers, who have been enjoying this glorious spring weather, growing and creating with the children.

In preparation for the Christmas school holidays, we are seeking volunteers for small amounts of hand watering and harvesting. Do you walk past or through the school frequently? Would you be able to wander through and check the garden for us, for a few days in the school holidays? This might involve a bit of watering and harvesting too.
