New Report Formats... What did you think?

Last Friday, our first Semester reports were sent home to parents. These reports were in a different format to previous report formats. The changes were made because of new Australian wide agreements under the Australian Curriculum. We thank Alison McLean for her hard work in leading the staff with this task. She has put in many, many hours developing the new format from scratch and fine tuning and ironing out difficulties. We are confident that parents will find the report formats clear and informative.

Australian Curriculum

Our teachers have been busy over the past few years learning and applying the new Australian Curriculum. Maths and Science have been adopted in the past few years, and English and History are being implemented this year.

Parents of Reception students will notice:

In their first year of school, students are not given A B C or D grades. They are graded on effort only. Teachers will comment on their strengths and areas of need.

Parents of students in Years 1 - 7 will notice:

Four subject Areas- English, Mathematics, Science and History have been rated against the Australian Curriculum, and other subject areas have been rated against our South Australian Curriculum. This is because we are gradually implementing the Australian Curriculum, as curriculum for different subject areas is written.

Students have been given A- E grades. In the past we have rated students with a number 1 – 5. While these numbers corresponded with grades, the grades were not so readily apparent. Students have also been assessed against Personal and Social Skills. Previous report formats have also assessed children against Personal and Work Skills, however there have been some changes of wording, and criteria. Staff have made changes here too, to reflect he General Capabilities aspects of the Australian Curriculum.

The 7 General Capabilities are skills which weave across the curriculum, and are used in all subjects. These are:

Literacy, Numeracy and Information and Communication Technology (ICT) across the curriculum and in real life
Critical and creative thinking
Personal and social capability
Ethical understanding
Intercultural understanding

In the Personal and Social Skills, we report on skills from the General Capabilities in Critical and Creative thinking, Personal and social capability and Ethical Understanding (our Super Seven values). For Literacy and Numeracy Across the Curriculum, skills from the other General Capabilities may be commented on in the General Comments statements from teachers.





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Kitchen and Garden Snippets

Firstly, thankyou to the thoughtful people who have kindly donated various items, manure, tiles, shredded paper, a cane basket, rubber boots and hay. They are gratefully accepted. We are still looking for any tiles (coloured ones would be great, broken flat plates, coloured glass beads — anything suitable for mosaicking. Also, broomsticks, old overalls, shirts, pants, straw hats- suitable for making scarecrows.

If you have any surplus seasonal produce we would welcome your donation for cooking in the kitchen or for our Market Stall, held every Thursday. Any of these items can be left at the garden shed, Molly Miels office or front office.

During this term we have been very productive making worm farms out of polypipe (you can see them dotted around in the garden), drilling wine barrels, exploring the parts of a plant and flowers, planting red onions, spring onions, kale, rhubarb, asparagus and carrots. As well as harvesting potatoes, Jerusalem artichokes, carrots, spinach, snow peas, rhubarb rocket and radishes! We have been testing pH levels, examining the how and why we recycle in the garden, composting, bird watching, worm farming, weeding and watering! And...caring for our beloved chooks!

In the holidays Janelle will be at school on the first Thursday (11th July) from 10am until 2pm. If you can spare an hour to help to shift a pile of soil to our orchard and a few top ups of beds, many wheelbarrows make light work! If you feel creative you may want to have a go at building a strawberry planter made from pallets. There are very small painting jobs, a little bit of light weeding and some beds to be defined with new sleepers. For planning, if would help if you are able to inform me if you plan to attend - you can text me on 0410 396 856 or leave a message at the front office. Or...just turn up. Soup pot will be on.

Lastly, we need to once again thank our volunteers who give their time to our wonderful program and the children. Your presence is highly valued. Please speak to me if you or someone you know can spare 45 minutes once a fortnight to have a small group of children in the garden. Instructions included!

Reports....Some Questions parents may ask:

My child has not done as well in English as they have in the past, why is this?

In the our report formats allowed separate assessment for Reading, Writing, Speaking and Listening and Spelling. Students could be given a 1 (or A) for reading, 2 (B) for Spelling and a 3 (C) for Writing or Listening and Speaking. The same applied to Maths where a student was given 3 separate grades.

Under the Australian Curriculum requirements, schools are required to give just one grade for English and one for Maths. It is harder to get an A for English as a whole or Maths as a whole than it is for just one aspect of English or Maths.

What does my child have to do to get an A?

The criteria used for the grades are outlined here.

We also encourage students and parents to ask teachers exactly what their child would need to do to improve their grades. Teachers are well versed in *Assessment for Learning Strategies*, and explaining to students in detail what is required, is an important step in helping them improve their achievement.

I liked the comments from the History teacher and Maths teacher in the Year 6/7 reports

I thought the reports showed a detailed knowledge of my child, warts and all.

Why has my child received a N/A for History. Does this mean they don't do History?

Our school uses an Inquiry Scope and Sequence to teach History and Science, (Australian Curriculum) Health, and aspects of Society and Environment from the South Australian Curriculum. In our approach rather that have a 1 hour lesson in each subject each week, our teachers schedule in significant time for a 5 – 6 weeks, enabling an intensive unit of work to be studied. This allows for greater depth of study, and results in greater curiosity, excitement and interest from children. A "Not Applicable" grade indicates that in the first term and second term up until Week 7 when teachers completed their reports, the children had not completed a Unit in History. Inquiry Units completed up until that date could have been Health, Science and a Society and Environment unit.. In future Society and Environment will be replaced by Australian Curriculum Geography. By end of the year report, intensive units of work will have been completed in all areas of study.

My child in Year 6/7 has received a N/A grade for Music. Why is this?

Our specialist Music Program is taught from Reception to Year 5. In Year 6/7 students are provided with optional Music Experiences such as choir and the instrumental music program. They also participate in music performances such as the Music is Fun Band, and in the Footsteps Dance program. These are not graded, but are included in the co-curricula experiences, and might be commented on in the general comments box. In future reports, the Music Area of study will be taken out of the Year 6/7 report.

I received an optional interview form in my report,...why?

We now build in the opportunity for parents to meet with teachers about their child's progress early in Term 3. This change was introduced in 2012 as a result of parent comments in the 2011 staff survey. This optional second interview is organised at either teacher or parent request. Please complete and return the form to your teacher by the end of this week.

Opportunity for parent comment on reports

Our staff survey in 2013 will once again be posted out to all parents. Additional questions will be added to the survey to seek parent feedback on the reports and reporting process. Please look out for it. We will encourage your response.

Activities include:


