Positive Education, the effect of Gratitude

Have you received something from your child recently to say how grateful they are? Has someone recently done you an act of kindness?

In Positive Education as advocated by Martin Seligman, gratitude has an important role in lifting a person's positive emotion, or happiness. The act of showing gratitude or doing a kind act gives happiness to the person doing it and also lifts the spirits of the person on the receiving end. It is an important strategy in improving wellbeing. Our newsletter has given reports previously of classes who assigned the task of expressing gratitude to their parents or the task of doing an act of kindness to a family member or to classmates. The students involved reported how good it felt when they saw the happiness of the person receiving the letter, or kind act. Last term we had a gratitude tree in the library for students, parents and teachers to add to. There is currently a gratitude board outside Helen Forrest's class in Room 2 for parents or teachers to leave messages on. Recently I received a number of letters from parents stating how much they appreciated their childrens' class teachers and why. I passed these on to the teachers, I can confirm, receiving these letters lifted the teachers' spirits, and made their day!

BUSHFIRE EMERGENCY PLAN

Bushfires also happen on days which are not of Code Red Catastrophic Risk.

What is our School's Bushfire Plan?

(Note a day of total fire ban is not the same thing as a Code Red Catastrophic day).

In the coming weeks we will practice our Bushfire Emergency Plans, to ensure we are well prepared in the case of an emergency.

Level 1 On a total fire ban day, staff are reminded of our bushfire plan. Excursions may be cancelled, at the discretion of the principal. Classroom rolls are kept ready, and front office personnel are given the task of listening to the radio, to monitor for fire alerts. At all levels of alert, teachers' primary responsibility is to keep children calm.

Level 2 If a fire threatens our immediate area. At this stage, we keep children in their classrooms, cancel any specialist lessons and ensure the children have drink bottles filled with water. The teacher checks that all windows and doors are closed, and removes flammable materials (eg paintings hung on walls and on wires around the room.) At this stage we would expect that it would be smoky and unpleasant outside, and parents may begin to come and collect children. Parents must sign children out at the front office, so we can keep a record of who has left.

Level 3 If the fire front is threatening the school. At this stage children take their drink bottles, and move to their bushfire ready building. We have two: the main administration building, and Molly Miels building (Preschool and Rms 13 - 16 children move to the main building). When the fire front passes, they lie on the floor. After the fire front passes we would wait to be advised by police/CFS of the next steps to follow, ring the DECS Hills district office (In Mt Barker) to update them on our situation, and gain instructions. Often the school is the safest place in a community, and parents are invited to come in and shelter with teachers and children if they would like to do so.


Schools that have experienced emergencies state that the biggest problem is with communication. Parents are unable to contact the school by phone, and school mobiles are used to keep in contact with emergency services. People will turn up to collect children, and staff may not know who they are, or if the parents have given permission. For that reason on the consent form sent home earlier this year, we asked.. "In the case of bushfire, are you likely to delegate to another person to collect your children?" Parents were asked to indicate, Yes, I may delegate or No under no circumstances. We will still try to contact you first, however this gives us some guidance if contact is not possible.

Have you forgotten what you answered to the question, " Are you likely to delegate authority for another person to collect your children in the event of a bushfire?" Please ring Debbie Jackson at the front office to check or update your response.

We are hopeful that we will not need to use Level 3 procedures, but it is important to be prepared in case. Today we had a bushfire drill and practised implementing our Bushfire Levels 1 - 3. I am sure the students will tell you about it.

Our scores are above the national mean in those areas marked in yellow.

Highlights 2013

- 100% sat the test in Year 7
- At Year 3 level, one student was withdrawn by parents, 100% of the remainder of the students sat all tests except for numeracy where 2 were absent
- At Year 5 level 2 students were absent for numeracy and 1 for reading.

This is an excellent participation rate, and shows that parents value the NAPLAN assessments.

How did we go?

- We are above the Australian mean in 4 of the 15 areas tested, and in others (eg Year 5 Reading) we were very close.
- While our scores were down a little in Year 3, scores for girls in Year 3 were better, and above the Australian mean in Reading.

What are the areas in which we performed the best? Year 5 Numeracy and Spelling. Year 7 Reading was

significantly above the Australian Mean.

What are the areas of most concern?

Our performance in Persuasive Writing across the board was of the most concern. As this is the third year in a row, it will become a major focus on our site learning plan to address this issue.

What have been our biggest improvements?

The number of children achieving in the top 25% for progress since they last sat the test 2 years ago. Note we had 36% Year 5 Numeracy, 32 % Year 5 reading, and 40% Year 7 Numeracy and 28% Year 7 reading. This means the students have worked hard in the last 2 years and their progress is very good.

National Minimum Standards

We aim to have all our students achieve above National Minimum Standards. Students below minimum standards: Year 3 - 6 children in 11 areas

Year 5 - 4 students in 6 areas.

Year 7 - 2 students in 3 area each

Congratulations to our High Achievers

There are two ways of measuring high achievement. We celebrate with those students who have made the most progress since they sat the previous NAPLAN. We also congratulate those students who were in the top band of achievement.
