#### Reminders:

Have you completed your parent survey for 2015? We really value your feedback, and it is used to make plans and improve the school. So far 55 school families have responded online, and 14 Preschool families. We are hoping for double that number. Reminder emails will be sent out to all families, as we have no way of knowing which families have responded. Please ignore, if you have already completed a survey. If you have started, but not yet completed, please complete it, because we do not receive your responses until complete. We know from online data that the average time taken to complete the survey is around 10 minutes.

We thank those families who have let us know if their children will be leaving us at the end of 2015, as that greatly assists with our planning. #### Bike Education Week

Recently the Year 4&5's all took part in a Bike Education Program. Parents and teachers have noted what a valuable program this is, and everyone who participated thoroughly enjoyed the experience and the chance to learn new skills and how to be safe while riding a bike.









## Kitchen Garden Query

Some parents have wondered why students in the Kitchen Garden program are not able to eat all of the treats that they bake every week. This was discussed at Governing Council last week and together we decided it would be worthwhile explaining the reasoning to all families.

Unfortunately the SAKG program and DECD policies are quite proscriptive about sweets. The students can only have dessert once a term as part of the program, and that needs to be fruit or vegetable based. If we did not bake these items, we would be replacing them with another vegetable dish, such as sautéed vegetables or a second salad.

The SAKG committee of parents and teachers decided a number of years ago to give students the opportunity to do baking more regularly, in order to:

- Learn baking and preserving skills, and
- Contribute to the program, in the way of community service.

Students rotate their lessons, so every fifth lesson they bake or preserve. Some of these baking sessions are for the stall and some are eaten by the class (usually savoury baked goods such as pumpkin scones, quiche). This means approximately once every ten cooking classes, or twice a year, the students do not taste what they cook. Some of these students purchase the items from the stall, and others ask for the recipe so they can bake them at home.

This is an act of community service, to give something back to the program and help it to run. This is supported by our Positive Education philosophy, and what research shows us about acts of kindness and generosity being important for our wellbeing. We have found the students to be really happy to contribute to the program in this way when they understand the reasoning.

Parents pay \$36 a year towards the running of the program. Although this is only a small percentage of the costs of running this program, we prefer to keep the costs low for parents and aim to raise the \$13,000 a year shortfall through fundraising. Parents and staff work hard to make this happen, and we thank families for supporting our fundraising efforts! The baked goods for the stall are the students' contribution to this program that we know they value highly.

## Bunnings Sausage Sizzle Fundraiser

On Sunday 1st November, the school held a sausage sizzle fundraiser at Bunnings to raise funds towards the SAKG program.

The weather was perfect, and the day was very successful with a total of approximately \$1100 being raised.

This day would not have been as successful without the tireless efforts of our volunteers who helped out on the day.

#### Achievement Awards

What do we value in our school more, wellbeing or achievement?... And how do we know? questions asked at a Positive Education Workshop at St Peters College, Adelaide last year. The presenter then outlined that for their school, despite a big focus on wellbeing and Positive Education, almost all merit certificates were given for achievement, not for effort, citizenship, or displaying values.

This challenged my thinking. Until then, I considered our school valued achievement and wellbeing equally. however we give almost no awards for achievement. Parents and teachers love our Principal's Awards, which are for displaying school Super Seven Values, as do I. These awards will continue for the majority of the time. In addition for two or three assemblies each year, teachers will nominate two students from their class for Outstanding Achievement in their classroom tasks. would anticipate that each one of these students outlined below has also put in a very good effort, worked tough, and improved their thinking with a growth mindset. The awards vary from outstanding achievement in a curriculum area, working hard to complete a lengthy support program such as Multilit, or excellent demonstration of knowledge and skills in a classroom project.
